Saturday's sessions will be in the John Hume Building:




Lunch will be in the Arts Building.

The Irish Association of Law Teachers

The Irish Association of Law Teachers (IALT) was established in 1979 as an all-island association with the aim of promoting excellence in legal education and scholarship. The annual conference is the focal point of the Association's year. The conference venue changes annually to reflect the broad geographical spread of our members. In recent years the conference has been held in Athlone (2018), Limerick (2019), Cork (2021), Belfast (2022) and Dublin (2023).

The Association has organised various workshops and seminars over the years. In spring 2024, the IALT held its annual Spring Discourse in Ulster University in Belfast on the theme of Hate Speech and Crime. We were joined by Prof. Jennifer Schweppe (University of Limerick) and Dr. Colin Caughey (Northern Ireland Human Rights Commission).

There have been several publications of the Association. In 1984 the IALT published an *Index to Irish Superior Court Written Judgments 1976-1982*, edited by Jennifer Aston and Maeve Doyle, followed in 1990 by an *Index to Cases Decided in the Supreme Court, Court of Criminal Appeal and High Court, 1966-1975*. Papers delivered at the 1999 Conference were later published in a collection of essays edited by Eoin O'Dell, *Leading Cases of the Twentieth Century* (Round Hall 2000). In 2011 a collection of essays edited by Jennifer Schweppe and Thomas Mohr, *30 Years of Legal Scholarship* (Round Hall 2011) was published, marking the development of legal scholarship in Ireland, and charting the history of the Irish Association of Law Teachers. In 2019, Mark Coen compiled *IALT Reflections 1979-2019*, drawing together individual reflections and photographs highlighting the personal significance and experiences of IALT members over the years.

From its inception, the Association has welcomed members from all institutions involved in the provision of legal education across the island of Ireland, whether in universities, technological universities, institutes of technology, private colleges, or professional institutions.
